From the Pastor

H.B. Charles, the pastor of Shiloh Metropolitan Baptist Church in Jacksonville, FL writes, "All that we do in the name of Christ is to be fueled by prayer. Much prayer, much power; little prayer, littler power; no prayer, no power!" (*A Biblical Answer for Racial Unity*, 28-9). The late Scottish pastor James Philip is even more to the point, "If it is through prayer that the Spirit of God comes upon the Church in tongues of fire, and that Satan falls as lightening to the ground, then prayer must be the unquestioned and unassailable first priority in our lives and in our fellowship" (*Serving the Word of God* ed's David Wright & David Stay, 67). The Lord works in his church through the ministry of the Holy Spirit and the Spirit largely works in response to the prayers of the saints. From Genesis to Revelation we read how God works in the lives of his people and the ministry of his church through prayer. Homecoming is Sunday, September 9

And when it comes to the life of the church, the Lord especially works as his people pray together. In a day when the church's weekly "prayer meeting" is largely written off as a relic of the past, there could not be a greater need for its revival. In his excellent article "The Prayer Meeting" (*Tabletalk*, 4/18, 57) Derek Thomas notes how the book of Acts is a case study in the power of corporate prayer. First of all, the church was conceived in prayer. Jesus had instructed his disciples to wait for the Holy Spirit. As they waited they prayed (1:14). Luke writes, "All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers" (ESV). The phrase "with one accord" (one word in Greek) suggests that there was a unity, as well as a corporate nature, to their prayer life. The word "devoted" tells us that they persisted in prayer. Rather than a one-night prayer vigil (which is not a bad thing), it was a way of life. So when they needed an apostle to replace Judas, what did they do? They prayed and the Lord made his will known (1:24). And in response to the prayers of the saints the Holy Spirit came at Pentecost and 3000 souls were saved. This only strengthened their resolve to pray. Immediately after Pentecost we read that the newly formed church was still devoting itself to, among other things, "the prayers" (2:42). Throughout Acts we see that the church was gathering regularly for payer.

The church in the United States is in dire need of power. If we want to see the power of the Holy Spirit unleashed among us, we will give ourselves not just to prayer but to corporate prayer, prayer services, even "prayer meetings." And there is no better time to pray together than at the close of the Lord's Day. Gathering together for Word and prayer at the close of the Lord's day provides a helpful reminder that the whole day belongs to God. There is no better way to be built up in the faith and prepared for the week ahead than to close the day together with God.

That said, beginning Sunday, September 16th we will be closing each Lord's Day (except the first Sunday of each month) with a prayer service including a devotion from scripture and a season of corporate prayer. Our season of prayer will include adoration, confession, and thanksgiving, as well as a substantial time for supplication and intercession. We will pray a bit more specifically (though not inappropriately so) than in the morning, including prayers for our missionaries and ministries, those who are sick among us and the salvation of the lost, for the preached Word and persecuted believers. And we can rest assured that the Lord will answer. Please join us starting September 16th at 6:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. As Sinclair Ferguson puts it, "Nothing builds fellowship quite like a prayer meeting."
