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From the Pastor:

Tolle Lege: Latin for "take up and read." The story goes that after the great St. Augustine had grown tired of sensuality and licentiousness he had begun to be intrigued with Christianity and had even begun reading his Bible (his mother was praying for him all the while and before). Then came the day as he was seeking God in prayer, he heard a still small voice that seemed to be the voice of children – "Tolle lege, tolle, lege." In English that is "take up and read; take up and read." He took that as his cue to open his Bible, and as he did, his eyes fell to Romans 13:13-4 which reads, "Let us walk properly as in the day-time, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires" (ESV). Not only did those words lead to Augustine's conversion, Augustine himself became perhaps the greatest giant of the Christian faith, following the apostles and prior to the protestant reformers. And it all began with "take up and read."

The most obvious upshot of that is that we all need to be reading our Bibles. But it is good to read other books as well. Here are a few I have read in the past couple of years that I think might prove helpful, encouraging, and/or stimulating.

- 1. Canon Revisited by Michael Kruger
 - Have you ever wondered how it is that we have the books included in our New Testament, no more and no less? And this Could we be wrong? Would you like to have more confidence that the books we have are the right and only ones and be able to defend those books if challenged? Kruger is the president of the Charlotte campus of Reformed Theological Seminary with a specialty of the area of canon that is the books which compose our Bible. His work is quite helpful to this end. Actually, he has done an audio/video teaching series on this very topic which is available through Ligonier Ministries. If you have an interest, you might want to hear him first. Very helpful either way.
- 2. God's Battle Plan for the Mind by David Saxton
 - As encouraged above, we contemporary evangelicals tend to do some Bible reading, perhaps much Bible reading; yet for the most part we are not so much inclined toward meditating upon scripture. The Puritans perfected the art of meditation. They meditated upon the created world; they meditated upon scripture. Saxton captures that and makes helpful suggestions concerning how we might follow in their steps.
- 3. It Couldn't Just Happen by Lawrence O. Richards
 - This is a critique of evolution written by a scientist who has lectured at some of our nation's most prestigious universities, including Princeton. Ginny suggested Knox and I work through it together and we are gradually doing that. Richards methodically takes on the case for Darwini-an evolution and shows why the biblical view of creation makes far more sense.
- 4. No Little Women by Aimee Byrd
 - Byrd gained a bit of notoriety as a blogger as well as a contributor of articles to evangelical magazines, including *Tabletalk*. Of late she has come under a bit of criticism for the stances she apparently takes in one of her latest books (I have not read the book and offer no comment). That said, in *No Little Women* she challenges women to dig deeper into the things of God, even as she challenges church leaders to give far more attention to "women's ministries" and pastors to give far more consideration to the woman's perspective as they are preparing their sermons and studies. I will say she probably spills a bit much ink saying what she really needed to say. And I don't sign off on everything in the book. Nevertheless, I found it very challenging and helpful.

- 5. Head Ball Coach by Steve Spurrier
 - I saved the best for the last. This is probably my favorite in the list, partly because it is a biography, partly because it is sports-related, and partly because it is life story of one of the greatest coaches in college football history, told by the "head ball coach" himself. Many remember Spurrier as the boastful and sometimes angry football coach of the Florida Gators. Others remember how his experience at the helm of the South Carolina Gamecocks humbled him a bit, even as he took them to unprecedented heights. What many do not know is that his father was an evangelical Presbyterian Pastor, who late in life came into the Presbyterian Church in America. Along with his later football exploits, Spurrier relates growing up in that home observing his dad's life of integrity and piety and how that impacted him. While acknowledging his faults, Spurrier also relates how he tried to play by the rules, treat his players well, and do things the right way. There is not a great deal about his church life in the book; he does profess faith in Christ, nonetheless, and shows how he put into practice many of the truths he learned in a Christian home. Moreover, he shows how dads can set examples for the children and how we all ought to behave.

We never cease to learn as Christians, and one way we grow is by reading. That includes the Bible as well as other books. Yet no matter what book we are reading, we always need to be asking ourselves how this book impacts my life. Even if you are reading a novel, you are asking yourself "How does this story interact with the truths of scripture?" It is good to read. Tolle lege.

The Women in the Church (WIC) met Tuesday, January 12 in the Fellowship Hall. Missions to the World Chairman Beth Byant had the program. She displayed four nativity sets from different countries and reviewed the vision of the Missions to the World, referencing scriptures starting with The Great Commission from Matthew 28: 16-20. The International Mission Board of the Southern Baptists Convention suggests that there are possibly over 3,000 ethnic people groups that are not only unreached, but also completely un-engaged meaning there is no known active on-site church planting efforts underway. She described the purpose of Wycliffe Bible Translators who provide translations in text, audio, video, sign language and songs. Praying for missionaries is something that we can all do and Beth reviewed a prayer guide for them. She had packets available for the ladies to take home which included: Pray for Bibleless People guide from Wycliff; information about Wycliff; a booklet titled The 2021 Finish Line by Wycliff; and a guide for praying for missionaries.

Beth also updated the group that the grounds committee has met and she has spoken with the landscaping director at Sandhills Community College who said that students need a project in the spring and the church landscaping project will be submitted. Beth has sent photos and if the project is accepted, a \$150 donation will be made to the college.

WIC President Patricia McCormick reviewed upcoming events including those in April which are the Maundy Thursday service; Easter Sunrise service, and the Love Gift dinner and offering. A brief WIC business meeting usually follows the dinner. Discussion followed about the meals and these will be evaluated closer to the event dates.
