From the Pastor:

"The Sychar Revival"

What can happen when one person gets really excited about Jesus? What are the possibilities for revival in a small town? In one sense, of course, the answer is, "That depends on how the Holy Spirit moves" (John 3:8). In another sense, don't underestimate the possibilities if just one person meets Jesus, becomes friends with Him, and then proceeds to tell others about Him. That is what happened long ago just outside the tiny village of Sychar.

You are likely familiar with the story, though perhaps more familiar with the first part than the last. Jesus was on his way from Judea in the south to Galilee in the north. He intentionally went out of his way to go through a town named Sychar near Jacob's well. He headed outside town to that well and encountered a woman there. He began by asking her for a drink. She was surprised given that she was not only a woman, but also a Samaritan and, what's more, had shall we say a "bad reputation." He wound up telling her that he could give her something better than the water which quenches temporal thirst. He could give her "living water," which of course only puzzled her. The conversation progressed until the point Jesus decided to show her why she needed living water: she had been drinking from dry cisterns, hardly knew it, and certainly was not the better for it. At any rate, Jesus told her that if she would only drink the water which only He could give, then she would never thirst again. She replied, "Sir, give me this water, so that I will not be thirsty or have to come here to draw water" (vv. 9-15).

Well, an evangelist who only wanted to claim a "Christian scalp" with no concern for seeing a true conversion would have quickly told her that he was that living water, gotten her to pray a "sinner's prayer," and returned to his disciples to announce his victory. Jesus knew better. He knew she was not quite ready. So, he began to "meddle" as some have called it when application gets personal. "Go, call your husband, and come here" (v. 16). She responds "rightly" that she has no husband. He informs her that she is correct and does not have just one but has had five and is not married to her current roommate (vv. 17-8).

Well, the lady was feeling a bit uncomfortable, and she did what any of us would have done. She switched the topic. Let's talk worship, she said. Let's talk theology (a good thing in itself but sometimes can be cover for talking about the sin in our life). She had questions about the proper place to worship, a fair question. Was it Jerusalem (according to the Jews) or Samaria (as per the Samaritans)? Jesus wasn't biting on that very important question. Rather, he pointed forward to a day when the place people worship would not matter so much as who they worship and how (vv. 19-24).

The conversation continues to progress with the woman perhaps hoping that she has dodged the interrogation into her personal life. She informs him that she is looking forward to the Messiah, at least they have that in common and probably a safe conversation direction. Most likely to her amazement Jesus responds, "I who speak to you am he" (v. 28). The disciples return only to quietly "marvel" that Jesus was talking with her. As for the woman, she has heard enough and knows enough. She quickly proceeds back into town to proclaim the "good news" – "Come, see a man who told me all that I ever did? Can this be the Christ?" As a result, all the townsfolk head out to find Jesus (vv. 27-30).

John goes on to tell us, "Many Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony" (v. 39). And what was that testimony? "He told me everything that I ever did." As a result, many Samaritans begged Jesus to stay with them. He stayed two days, and we are told that many more believed. It was not ultimately the woman's testimony which drew them to faith. It was Jesus himself. However, the woman's testimony was sufficient to move them to investigate. They met him and believed because they had seen him with their own eyes and heard him with their own ears. They were convinced he was indeed "the Savior of the world" (vv. Vv. 39-42). It is always that way when people truly investigate to see who Jesus truly is.

Back to that woman's testimony. The woman's words were, "Come, see a man who told me all that I ever did" (29a). To make sure we get the point John repeats her testimony, "He told me all that I ever did" (v. 39). Do you hear what she is saying? It is not, "He told me all the good things I did and couldn't help but love me." No, she is saying (and they know what she is saying), "He told me all the bad things I have done and loved me anyway." She loved him for that reason, and she believed him for that reason. She had found the long-awaited Messiah and guess what? The long-awaited Messiah was a friend of sinners, and sinners of the worst sort. She couldn't keep the good news to herself. She went back into town and told everyone she met. They heard her testimony, investigated for themselves, and many in the town believed. That is the story of revival. Many people find Jesus to be a friend of sinners. They then tell others they have met Jesus and found him to be a friend of sinners. Those investigate, many believe, the church grows, and the town is transformed.

Yes, that's revival. And if the Holy Spirit moves, it could happen in Ellerbe. We can't, of course, decide whether such a revival will come or when, but we can pray and we can witness, bear witness to Jesus, "the sinner's friend." If we do, who knows what God might do?

REVIVAL SERVICES 2025

Revival: The theme for this year's Revival is "Jesus, the Sinner's Friend" (Luke 5:12-32). With us for Sunday School, as well as our morning and evening service on Sunday is Dr. Neil C. Stewart, Senior Pastor at the First Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC. Raised in Northern Ireland, Dr. Stewart came to faith as a teenager through the witness of high school friends. He studied medicine at the Queen's University of Belfast, where he met and married Catherine Jane Johnson. In his final year of medical school, Neil was awarded the Ulster Hospital Gold Medal for his studies in medicine, general and orthopedic surgery, pediatrics, obstetrics, and gynecology. He was elected a member of the Royal College of Pediatrics and Child Health in 1997. As a pediatrician, Neil served in the historic Royal Belfast Hospital for Sick Children.

Our revival services begin Sunday, March 30th with Sunday School at 10 am and worship service at 11 am. On Sunday evening there will be a pre-service prayer meeting at 5:30 pm followed by worship at 6 pm. On Monday through Wednesday, the pre-service prayer meeting will be at 6:30 pm followed by the worship service at 7 pm. Juan Rodriguez, the Reformed University Fellowship campus minister for UNC-Charlotte will be preaching Monday evening; Bo Collins, the pastor of Redeemer Presbyterian Church (Southern Pines), Tuesday evening; and Greg Salazar, the organizing pastor of the Myers Park Mission Church (Charlotte), Wednesday evening.
